also hoped they would be able to find transportation once they got there and boarded their flights, each brother leaving from a different city, which was an adventure in itself. (Mel lives in L.A. and flew from LAX, Neil lives in Santa Rosa and flew from San Francisco.) Their trip lasted a month! And, luckily for us, they shot a good amount of video and lots of pictures.

They had funny experiences, joyous fishing, and some unforeseen problems that were overcome.

They have not only great stories to tell, but also enjoyable, humorous and illuminating video to show us. (After Neil's return home he bought editing software, contracted with a high school student to tutor him on editing, and, through his young tutor and trial and error, became a good editor.) During their adventure, they learned a lot, and luckily for us, we will as well, but without having to live through the difficulties they did. And if you want to see what it is like to catch huge sea-run brown trout, along with big resident brown trout in an amazing

river and spring creek at the bottom of Patagonia, all the while traveling around on their own, camping out, going to local grocery stores, cooking most of their own meals, meeting locals, learning the customs and drinking the Argentinian ubiquitous drink that is as popular there as coffee is here (in Argentina it is known to all as "Mate"), don't miss this presentation.

Mel, Neil and their sister were born in Minnesota, but when they were all toddlers, the family moved to California, settling in Santa Rosa. It was there that the Light brothers became enraptured with fishing. Their parents weren't fishers, but Neil believes a genetic "bug" must have been passed to them from their grandfather who was a fisherman in Minnesota. In their teens, they both became absolute fishing fanatics.

Mel attended Santa Rosa Junior College before entering the Army, where he served as a 1st Lieutenant in Special Forces in Vietnam. After the Army, Mel settled in SoCal, attended Santa Monica Junior College and started his own landscape contracting company. He backpacked and explored many of the streams in the Sierra and has since fished most of the rivers all around the western states in the U.S. . . . and that means almost **all** the rivers. For example, last year Mel fished more than 90 days, with his specialty being dry fly fishing using tiny flies. In fact, of the most recent 25 fish Mel caught this year, he got them all on flies size 24 or smaller. He is a creative fly tier, creating many new patterns.

Neil is a woodworking artisan specializing in cabinetry and custom furniture who spends three to six months every year fishing around the globe. He loves to chase trout and steelhead in the U.S. northwest, Canada and Russia, along with saltwater species (tarpon, bonefish and snook) in Florida, South America and Christmas Island in the Pacific. Neil also attended Santa Rosa Junior College and later earned a B.A. degree from Chico State University. He, as well as Mel, is an innovative fly tier and has invented new patterns, including what has become known as "The California Neil."

These two siblings will be giving a presentation you will enjoy and learn from.

Scholarships are our Educational Thing-Read This!

A s past president of SPFF and a member for over twenty-five years, I am always looking for worthwhile opportunities to promote our sport and support youth education. It's been my pleasure to participate on the scholarship committee. Each year the Sierra Pacific Flyfishers offers scholarship opportunities to qualified senior high school senior applicants. This is an exciting process and offers the opportunity for us to meet students intending to work in fields that may help our fisheries. Applicants are seeking education in majors related to natural resources, fisheries, environmental science, forest resources, oceanography or related fields supporting our natural resources. Each candidate completes an application, writes an essay, provides transcripts with a minimum requirement of a 3.0 GPA and provides at least two letters of recommendation. The applications are screened by the scholarship committee to determine the award recipients. We have been very proud of the students receiving these funds.

The SPFF Foundation, a 501(c)(3), is pleased to accept donations supporting this purpose. SPFF has been involved in supporting students for many years and in the past several years received generous donations from a couple of members. At this time we are asking all members to support the purpose of supporting educational scholarships. No donation is too small. Our goal is to provide up to four scholarships or \$1000 each. At this time we anticipate a need to gather additional donations totaling \$2000 for the awarding of scholarships in May 2016.

To submit to this worthy cause you may write a check made out to the SPFF Foundation and in the memo area write "scholarship fund". You will be issued a receipt for your contribution. You may also contribute cash in the container labeled **SCHOLARSHIP** at the monthly meeting check-in desk.

2015 Recreation Festival at National Park Service Paramount Ranch

n Oct 24th, SPFF joined other outdoor enthusiasts at the second annual National Park Service Rec Fest, held at Paramount Ranch in Agoura Hills. The Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area is a mix of nonprofit, city, county, state and federal parklands making it the largest urban park in the nation. The National Park Service provided transportation for approximately 1,000 third and fifth graders and their parents from cities such as Bell, Gardena, East Hollywood, and Torrance, to visit the park for a day and experience what they could do in the outdoors. 












The Big Mo Outing Year Three

Mornings saw most nymphing until the bug hatches got going. Nymphing was and is generally the most productive method but the dry fly fishing can be off the hook this time of year. One guide fished a hopper with one foot of tippet to a Zebra Midge drifted through the risers. Works very well and easier to see for those of us without the best of vision. I did have a nice Brown trout eat my Hopper one day. Pounded the banks with streamers off and on over several days and managed a couple of fish this way. It became obvious this was not going to be the week streamer fishing was going to pay off.

Weather wise, except for a day and a half of cloud cover, its what we really wanted, it was clear including Friday when we saw unseasonal 80 degree weather. The fat and feisty fish averaged $16^{\circ}-20^{\circ}$ with more than half the group reporting fish over 21" to the net. Made for great theater with a lot of whoops and hollering from the gang. These trout fight harder than anywhere I personally have fished. Join us next year.

FLY FISHING AT CRYSTAL RANCH LODGE IN ALTAMONT UTAH

Late September four of us (Michael Tansey, George Weisefeld, Daniel Dokovna and I) flew to Utah and drove to the Crystal Ranch Lodge. It took us a little longer than usual as three out of four chose to not follow the GPS instructions and accordingly got lost. The lodge was beautiful and very tastefully decorated. The first day of three fishing days we went to Rock Creek. The fishing was difficult, large slippery rocks (next time we will be in better physical shape). I caught none, Daniel a few, Michael and George a few. Then we moved further up river to the spillway of the reservoir and caught a lot of small trout. That day Daniel caught 4 different species, Tiger Trout, Rainbow, Brookie and Brown.

Day two was fishing on the Yellowstone River for George and Daniel. The river is named for the local area, the Yellowstone valley, not the national park. Fishing was again tough, but smaller slippery rocks. Michael and I went to the Strawberry River, a tail water from the Starvation Reservoir. I caught a few up to 18 inches. Michael caught less. The third day we all went to the Strawberry. I caught some browns up to 18 inches, see photos. The others caught less. The lodge and guides were excellent, the fishing was tough but fun.

Overall the fishing was challenging, the guides were excellent, the accommodations were great, and the food was excellent. The lodge allows cooking your own meals or they can provide all meals
