Every fly fisher is to some degree a predator – at least to the fish – and fish react to us with fear, as they would to any predator. As a *de facto* predator, we need to recognize and utilize those skills that minimize fishes' ability to detect us. In the club's June presentation, our good friend and highly respect-

fishing expert Gary Borger will use an informative and light-hearted approach to cover the readily applicable skills that help anglers develop needed predatory skills that will help achieve success on any stream or lake.

And this means understanding the way fish perceive us, both visually and acoustically. And since

light and sound behave differently in air and water, the fly fisher needs to recognize the differences between the way a predator and the prey react to such sensory input.

No one is better suited to lead us on this journey than our brilliant presenter. Gary Borger holds a BS (1966), and an MS (1968) from Penn State

University and a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison (1971). He is Professor Emeritus of Biology at the University of Wisconsin Campus in Wausau where he taught for 28 years. During his career, he was presented with the Teacher of the Year Award on two different occasions and his achievements have been recognized in "Who's Who in Science and Engineering" and "Outstanding People of the 20th Century."



He has been a fly fisher since 1955, and, since 1972, has taught classes and lectured internationally on all aspects of fly fishing for trout and salmon. Gary has written ten best-selling books on fishing: "Nymphing," fly "Naturals," " The Borger Color System," "Designing Trout Flies," "Presentation," "Fishing the Film," "Reading Waters," "Long Flies," "The Angler as Predator," and "Fly Gear." Gary pioneered fly fishing video instruction with his release of "Nymphing" in 1982. Since then he has appeared in four videos for the 3M Company and, in cooperation with the Federation of Fly Fishers, produced the environmental video "Where The

Trout Are." His video production company has produced an additional 21 internationally acclaimed videos.

Gary was also a consultant on Robert Redford's movie "A River Runs Through It." He is a recipient of the Ross Allen Merigold Complete Angler Memorial Award, the Charles K. Fox Rising Trout Award, the Joan and Lee Wulff Conserva-

tion Award, the Buz Buszek Memorial Fly Tying Award and the Lifetime Achievement in Fly Casting Instruction Award from the Federation of Fly Fishers. In recognition of this work (and many other awards and achievements), Gary received the first Lew Jewett Memorial Life Membership in the Federation of Fly Fishers in 1979. Gary is currently

working on a 20-book series, titled **Fly Fishing**, and is working with Hardy of England to promote their excellent rods and reels.

We asked Gary how he got started in fly fishing, and he sent us this very personal memoir:



The Angler/Predator spends time stalking big fish, even to the point of lying down to remain as unnoticed as possible.

Fly Fishing is an arcane sport, and all who enter have their own reasons and entrance methodologies. Some "inherit" it from their parents or grandparents, others from relatives or friends, perhaps members of a club. My reasons were rather simple. I read about fly fishing in my father's outdoor magazines, and the idea of it totally captivated my young imagination. Though no one else in my family fished, let alone fly fished, I was, none-the-less, determined to make fly fishing my own. I asked my parents for a fly tying kit as the present for my 11th Christmas. They obliged, and I began assembling the most extraordinarily ugly flies ever seen. The next spring I cobbled together some fly gear and began fishing my crudely tied imitations. The first trout was a 10-inch stocked rainbow, caught on a Coachman wet fly a few weeks before my 12th birthday. That catch firmly cemented fly fishing to the core of my being, where it has ruled ever since.


THE GRADUATING CLASS OF 2017 – IT'S FISHING, NOT **CATCHING**

high ratio of instructors to students, the weekend was not a complete washout. The students split into groups and




fished all three public sections of Hot Creek, the Upper Owens from the bridge to the monument, Big Springs and the North Fork of Bishop Creek.



PESCA MAYA 2017 - A TALE OF TARPON AND WIND

C altwater flats fishing is unpredictable, exciting, frustrating and challenging. In my twentieth year of visits to Mexico's Ascension Bay, I am still awe struck by its natural beauty and diversity. It is a place that calls you back – often to settle a score with a fish you missed, or to catch its larger relatives. The variables of wind, water temperature and tides create the challenge and make every year different. I would subtitle 2017 as the "the year the veterans fought the wind." It is hardly news to say that Mexico can provide surprises and in twenty years, our group has seen its fair share. This year we arrived in Cancun on time (thanks Southwest), breezed through customs and hit the road for the three- hour ride south. No one looks forward to the dirt road where axle smashing potholes can re-arrange your internal organs. Imagine our surprise to be met by boat and spared two hours of road angst. My fellow veterans (Bob Yokoi, Smoother Smyth, Bruce Altrock) needed no help with rigging, fly selection, leader building or choosing guides. Our first day was blessed with a light breeze, clear skies and perfect tides. We cast at small schools of permit, but it was not until later in the day that we found ourselves on what I had always considered a large flat that only contained permit. Wilberth, our guide suggested we rig for tarpon (10 weight rod, 40 pound bite



at permit, tarpon, snook and bomefish in a rare early evening trip to a nearby flat. Bruce even landed a small permit that he deemed too small to photograph. Then came the wind or "mucho viento" which sent us scurrying for the shelter of mangroves. As a casting instructor, I stress that the wind can be your friend, which is true if you can angle yourself favorably. When the wind has the secondary effect of roiling up the sand on the shallow flats making visibility all but impossible, it's a different story. No weather was wild enough to dampen the spirits of this group. Good food and good company go along way when fishing is tough.


Warm weather has kicked off the runoff and the creek is flowing dirty. Fish the brightest patterns in your box.

Fishing Conditions and Hatches: Fair

The spring cutthroat run is just getting started. A lot of these fish are still mostly hanging in the lake waiting as the water is cold and dirty below the Things are starting to dry up are some resident fish and some rainbows that waited out the harsh winter to spawn with the cutthroat this year, but they're up high and in the deeper water.

> Please don't fish for cutthroat in 6" of water, or for any of them that are paired up. These fish are spawning, not staging at this point and are extremely vulnerable. Snagging these fish off their redds is very unethical and only serves to reduce their populations in the long run. Stick to the deeper bends as the fish in the deeper water are usually just therefor the free egg meal floating down river. If you're wading, don't walk in the shallow gravel beds, try to walk across in sections that are at least knee deep.
