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Successful Seasons: Tips for Catching Giant Trout All Year with Landon Mayer

One of the top guides in the Western United States, Colorado guide Landon Mayer makes a welcome return to the SoCal speaker circuit. His new videoenhanced program will lay to rest the myth that giant trout can only be caught in the Spring and Fall.

Landon Mayer's angling success is fueled by an addiction to pursuing large trout with small flies and lightweight fly-fishing equipment. Mayer enthusiastically teaches and demonstrates his techniques and onriver knowledge and has developed innovative strategies for sighting, hooking, and landing selective trout. After graduating high school, Landon pursued a career as a full time guide in Colorado, learning from great Colorado anglers such as Ed Engle, Pat Dorsey and fly tyer John Barr. He also spent one year guiding in Alaska on the Naknek River. During this same time, Landon began publishing articles in magazines such as Fly Fisherman, Fly Rod & Reel,

Mayer is a contributing writer for *Fly Fisherman* and *High Country Angler* magazines. His contributions also have been featured in publications such as *Fly Rod and Reel*, *American Angler*, *Southwest Fly Fishing*, Field

and Stream, and Fish and Fly magazines. As an ambassador in the fly-fishing industry, Mayer represents several lines including Simms Fly Fishing apparel and is a royalty fly designer for Umpqua Feather Merchants. He is also an advisory team member of Simms, R.L.Winton, Bauer, Scientific Angler, Smith Optics, Fish Pond, Yeti Coolers, Regal Vise, and Casio Pro Trek watches.

INTRODUCTION TO FLY TYING

This seven week course (Jan. 9, 16, 23, 30, Feb. 6, 13 & 20) will get you well on your way to a satisfying lifetime creating flies that will catch fish! FISHING REPORT: BARRACUDA ENCOUNTER

Barracudas are predatory fish known for their speed and aggressive behavior. They belong to the unique genus *Sphyraena*, the only genus in the family Sphyraenidae. Although there are 28 species worldwide, only a few are of interest to sport fishers. On the west coast of North America, *Sphyraena argentea*, the Pacific or California barracuda, ranges from Puget Sound to Cabo San Lucas and is a fairly popular game fish. But when most anglers think of catching barracudas, they are envisioning *Sphyraena barracuda*, the "great barracuda" (also called "giant barracuda") of the western Atlantic and Caribbean, a species that's also found in subtropical seas around the world. These amazing fish are classic ambush predators that patrol the upper water column, relying on bursts of speed up to 27 mph to run down other fish, their primary diet. They are especially fond of needlefish, another long, thin predator of the ocean's surface waters.

In recent years barracuda have begun to get more of the credit they deserve as a first rate game fish. Although fishing for them, even with fly rods, is nothing new, historically they have been seen as "the other game fish," something to turn to when conditions are not right for targeting bonefish, permit, tarpon,

dorado, or the many other prized fishes of the saltwater flats and adjacent seas. In fact, the Key West barracuda tournament known as the Cuda Bowl (open to spin and fly fishing), now in only its eighth year, was created by Florida Captain Justin Rea and his wife Loren to "help shallow water fishing guides generate more winter-time business," a description that seems to admit the low esteem that barracuda fishing has traditionally received. It was only at the end of this past year (December 30, 2018 – January 5, 2019) that the world's first "fly only" barracuda tournament, sponsored by Hatch Magazine and hosted by Bair's Lodge in the Bahamas, was launched. The description on the tournament's website (https://www.hatchmag.com/hatchmagazine-inaugural-barracuda-tournament) sums up the good and the bad of barracuda fly fishing:

"What fish is found on the flats year round, requires a stealthy, careful approach, bends over a stout 9 weight like it's a wet noodle, disappears fly line into backing in mere seconds and virtually never fails to put on an aerial show replete with leaps and head shakes and thrashes? It's not the bonefish. Or the coveted permit. Or even the burly tarpon. Nope. It's the barracuda. A fish we've long lamented as woefully undertargeted on the flats."


One of the great things about barracudas is that they are not overly finicky. If it is moving fast enough, they will usually attack just about anything long and shiny, and they will tear it to pieces. My son Paul (also a member of SPFF) and I had a couple of banner days with the barracudas of Andros Island recently, with countless numbers of large barracudas hurtling out of the water to hit our flies, somersaulting wildly when hooked and making screaming runs. After the 'cudas had completely destroyed my limited inventory of barracuda flies, our guide Torrie Bevans rigged up an old gray deck rag – seriously – by tearing it into long gray strips of fabric, inserting a few hooks connected by wire, and tying on some of the flashy remains of our ruined flies. It worked. That day, it seemed like almost anything would. But by far the most successful fly we used, garnering vicious hits within seconds of hitting the water, was a needlefish pattern of mine, which we dubbed the Cuda-Gra (as in *coup de grâce*; thanks to Paul for the name).

The Cuda-Gra is a long, thin, tandem-hooked fly. The pattern borrows heavily from an article on the Deneki Outdoors website, *How to Tie a Needlefish Fly for Barracuda*, a fly they recommend for fishing the barracuda-rich waters of Andros South, their excellent lodge on South Andros



Island: https://www.deneki.com/2016/01/needlefish-fly-for-barracuda-tying-instructions/. It differs only in the addition of some synthetic materials to make the color and movement a little more lifelike, and to make it more durable (although the word "durable" is a relative term when fly fishing for barracudas; our best fly survived only

three barracudas and one needlefish before it was destroyed). You can see the epoxied head of the fly – about all that is left of the fly after the fight – in the lower jaw of the fish in the photo below. The key to its success, I think, is the trailing hook, and of course the steel wire (I used 30 lb Rio Wire Bite) you need to connect the two hooks and to attach your leader to the fly. I'll post the directions for tying the Cuda-Gra elsewhere. But for now, I wanted to share some of the results of our trip. If this sounds like something that might interest you, I cannot say enough good things about the Andros South lodge, one of several fly fishing lodges (the others are in Alaska and British Columbia) managed by the folks at Deneki Outdoors. If you go, be sure to ask for Torrie. And tip him heavily. He's worth every penny.
