FISHING REPORT: THE MISSING MONUMENT

When I first joined SPFF and started fishing, I somehow ended up driving up to "the monument" on the upper Owens river above Lake Crowley. It was a good place for a beginner since there are no trees there and the chances of getting hung up in foliage was minimal (although I did manage to do it). In those days, "the monument" consisted of a base of cemented rocks, a rusted pipe sticking vertically out of it, and a rusted metal plate at the top of the pipe, upon which were posted notices of fishing rules for the area.

The river below the monument adhered to whatever rules were in effect for Lake Crowley at the time. It marked the upper-most limit of the lake. So fishing on that stretch would go from regular limits of five until August first, when it would be catch-and-release only, barbless hooks, etc.

Between the monument and the Benton Crossing bridge was an area that at some times had no fishing at all and at others fishing with certain limitations. I was told that these rules were to provide a spawning area at certain times of the year for the trout that came up out of the lake.

I fished the monument area before the Covid sequence and at that time, in addition to the old marker there was a very nice large wooden notice board with the current rules and dates for that area of the river. It was hard to miss, and I thought that it made things pretty clear about when and where you could fish.

So, during the recent GSO, I faithfully went to "the monument" but alas it was not to be seen. I drove up and down that area of the river along the fence looking for it. I did find the old rocks and pipe structure, but the fancy new wooden board was gone. I did find a paper notice on the fence that basically eliminated the division above and below the monument site and turned the whole stretch of the river between the lake and Benton bridge into a single fishing area. This is OK for metal slingers until July 31, and on August 1 it becomes a catch-and-release area only. So the area set aside for spawning is gone forever. All of this was the result of some sweeping changes made by the DFW to supposedly improve fishing in the area but which to me seems to be going in the wrong direction.

Anyway, there is no more monument physically or in the rules. My point is that you make sure about the new rules for fishing at your favorite spot because the rules may have changed.



FISHING REPORT: LYELL FORK BACKPACKING TRIP

The accompanying photos are from the Lyell Fork backpacking trip at GSO earlier this month. There were three of us: Mike Rupp, Nate Prunet, and me. Jim Fleisher and Richard Plunkett joined for the first section of the hike so they could fish for the day. Mike, Nate, and I continued on to an area of the stream that runs

over large slabs of granite, then crossed the Lyell Fork to a campsite located somewhat south of Ireland Creek. Nate was very persistent and was the top rod, catching many fish including some between 12 and 14 inches. We caught primarily brook trout, but also browns and a few rainbows. We experienced relatively mild temperatures and clear skies, but had frost one morning.

WANT TO CATCH SOME NEW SPECIES?

See a new part of Southern California? Come join us on a fly-only one day saltwater trip out of Oxnard and fish the Channel Islands. The islands get less angling pressure and the fishing CAN be off the charts. We will be fishing for California Kelp Bass (calico bass), yellowtail, white seabass, barracuda and bonito. We never know what will show up as it is dependent on water temperatures and currents but with two islands to choose from, there is always a place that is biting. Here are the details –

When – July 31 (Saturday), August 31 (Tuesday) and October 30 (Saturday)

Cost – 250.00 per person and includes bunk (bring your own pillow), bait (for chumming up fish), water and a lox/bagels/fixings breakfast. Bring a small ice chest with your lunch and for any fish you want to take home (catch/release is encouraged but keeping something for dinner is encouraged). The boat has coffee and a microwave. Allow 25.00-50.00 for crew tip/fish cleaning.

Anglers – trip is limited to 6 anglers and the host.

Time – The *Island Tak* leaves CISCO's Landing in Oxnard at 4 a.m. and we can board any time after 3 a.m. There are motels in the area if you want to come up early. We will return to the dock around 4-4:30 p.m.

Gear – 7-8 weight rods are fine, along with a good reel with either a full sink (preferred) or sink tip line. A stripping basket is a must as is the ability to double haul. Streamer flies in olive over white are effective. Purple over black can also be good, along with red/black, all white and just about any combination. Fish are funny that way. Clouser-style seem to be slightly more effective. We use straight 20# 6' leaders as they are not leader shy.

CASTING CORNER

Answer to last month's question:

This question (about which line would weigh more in the first 30 feet) was a tricky one. The correct answer was "they would all weigh the same" because all of the lines in the list of possible answers ere 6-weights. So despite the fact that one line is floating and another is sinking, and regardless of the taper, all of them would weigh the same in the first 30 feet of line. That's what makes them all 6 weight lines.

This month's question:

Graphite is by far the most common material for making fly rods these days. What are the differences (and are there advantages?) between graphite, fiberglass, and bamboo fly rods in terms of your casting? Is it only a personal preference, or are there circumstances where one type of rod might be preferred over another?
